Pupil Premium Report to Parents 2017/18

What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

- Pupil Premium is additional government funding allocated to schools since April 2011, to boost the
 attainment of disadvantaged children to ensure that every child fulfils his/her potential, whatever the
 circumstances.
- The funding is allocated to schools for children from Reception to Year 11 who have registered for free school meals in the last six years, are in care, or have parents in the Armed Forces.
- In the financial year, 2016/17, the Government has increased funding to £1325 per eligible pupil, £1900 per Child Looked After or child adopted from care and £300 for children from families of Services personnel.
- Schools can choose how they wish to spend this money, based upon their own knowledge of individual pupil needs.

How do we spend the Pupil Premium Grant?

- We talk to parents and carers of children receiving the funding, to ask for their ideas on what will help
 most. Some children will already be doing well in English, Maths or other subjects, but there may be
 things we can do to stretch them further, to help them aim high, or to build their confidence like taking
 part in activities to develop social or language skills, after school programmes or sports participation.
- Some children may need financial help so that they can take part in trips and activities.
- If children are behind in English, Maths or other subjects, we may arrange for them to have special
 small group or one-to-one teaching. We call these 'intervention programmes'. We choose the classroom
 approaches and intervention programmes that research shows works. We may use some of the money
 to support staff salaries to teach intervention groups in Maths & English (small group tuition). We use
 continuous assessment to ensure if an intervention is not working it is stopped and replaced with
 something else.
- We spend some money on training for staff to make sure they are up to date with the latest knowledge.

How much Pupil Premium Funding does Abbots Farm Junior School receive?

- From September 2018 the number of pupils eligible for pupil premium is 37 (14%)
- The indicative funding anticipated for 2017/18 is £45,232 (£1325 per eligible pupil x 30 & £1,900 x 3 LAC/child adopted from care)
